STURGEON BAY — It's not everyone who gets to visit the scene of one of Jesus' miracles — and never has to leave the country.

Last June, Sue and Shaun Melarvie became one of 5,000 extras on the set of "The Chosen," the Angel Studios' streaming series about Jesus' life.

The couple spent three days near Midlothian, Texas, in heat over 100 degrees, to help depict the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes.

Shaun has put together a PowerPoint presentation of the experience. The couple recently spoke before members of the St. Ann's Society at their parish, Corpus Christi in Sturgeon Bay.

It all began when the Melarvies started watching The Chosen on their phone before it became easier to find on other venues.

"I was hooked." Shaun said. "It's a crowd-funded enterprise, so I donated a small amount, about \$100." That got the couple on the mailing list and, about a year later, they were notified of the opportunity to become an extra for a donation of \$1,000.

"I sent them the \$1,000, but

Marian Shrine of Our Lady changes name in Champion

CHAMPION - Life changed in October 1859 for a Belgian immigrant woman named Adele Brise living in northeast Wisconsin. She met "the Queen of Heaven who prays for the conversion of sinners," a spiritual encounter that led to what is today the only approved

Marian apparition site in the United States.

Meeting the Blessed Mother brought huge changes to Adele's life and, ultimately, to the faith life of Catholics in northeast Wisconsin.

Another big change was announced on April 20 this year: The name of the apparition site, located at 4047 Chapel Drive in New Franken, is now "The National Shrine of Our Lady of Champion."

The site was most recently called "The National Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help." The official name change comes after Vatican approval was received of an annual feast day Mass to be celebrated at the Shrine each Oct. 9, beginning in 2023.

2 Wisdom brings the ability to recognize God and God's works. Related to that is Knowledge, which gives clear insight in discerning truth from error.

3 Understanding applies knowing about church teachings. It is related to Counsel which imparts the ability to know what to do in any situation.

Fortitude is the strength to persevere in the crosses on the way.

5 Piety increases the desire to give God glory and to do good." Fear of the Lord is similar, but also adds "reverence" for God.

ave you ever been at Mass and, as you listen to the readings, you feel as if God is speaking directly to you? You feel as if he knows your situation and needs and is speaking directly into your life.

Bishop David Ricken The reason you and I feel that is because he is speaking directly to us! The God of the Universe, who created all things, has given us his word — sacred Scripture — to reveal himself and speak directly to us. It is as if God had looked over your whole life and took the time to write to you a personal love letter.

Since God's Word is so personal and precious,

we ought to take time to read it. Ideally, we should do that each day to receive his comfort, care and guidance for our busy lives. As Pope Francis said in Evangelii Gaudium (152), "There is one particular way of listening to what the Lord wishes to tell us in his word and of letting ourselves be transformed by the Spirit. It is what we call lectio divina."

Yes, God's word, prayerfully read and pondered over, can transform us through the power of the Holy Spirit. I don't know about you, but I am always seeking for my life to be transformed by the Holy Spirit.

How do we experience this transformation in lectio divina (Latin for "divine reading")? We do this by pausing from our busy lifestyles to ponder God's Word. We let go of our agenda and open ourselves to what God wants to say to us.

Lectio divina is a simple four-step process that old and young alike can do. I always begin by asking the Holy Spirit to guide my reading of Scripture and allow him to reveal what he wishes.
